This course introduces North American Pre and Post-Contact History from an anthropological lens: by examining selected traditional Native American cultures from the perspectives of Native peoples with emphasis on change through time.

- 6. Explanations and interpretations of cultures and their histories
- 7. Overview of American history, stressing the history of intercultural interactions between Native Americans and Euro-Americans and the history of government policy toward Native American societies
- 8. Contemporary issues: problems and triumphs
- 9. Legacy of Native American cultures

D. Course Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Apply concepts, terms, and intellectual frameworks necessary for understanding and discussing Native American cultures and their histories. (Goal 5a, 5c, 7e)

- 7. Evaluate and analyze a variety of contemporary issues, both problems and triumphs, in the Native American community and in society at large. (Goal 2c, 2d; 5d; 7a, 7b, 7c, 7d)
- 8. Evaluate and understand the legacy of Native American cultures. (Goals 2a, 2b, 7c, 7d)
- 9. Discuss methods for assessing ignorance, misconceptions, and stereotypes related to Native Americans and demonstrate awareness of ethnocentrism in American history. (Goal 2d; 5d; 7a, 7c, 7e)
