Issues of nationality, race, ethnicity, class, gender, religion, etc., will be addressed.

- 5. Verbal (linguistic) and nonverbal communication
- 6. Cross cultural communication
- 7. Intercultural communication competence
- 8. Culture shock

- 7. Explain the need for intercultural communication competency in a global and everchanging world. (Goal 7e, 8d)
