Introduction to basic language skills. Development of listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills. Cultural understanding and sensitivity are important aspects of the course.

C. OUTLINE OF MAJOR CONTENT AREAS

1. Listening: Students listen to simple dialogues and classroom instructions and participate in small and large group exchanges.
2. Speaking: Students discuss themselves and their own lives, as well as other basic cultural and contemporary issues.
3. Reading: Students analyze the content of basic written materials such as cultural information, menus, schedules, advertisements, etc.
4. Writing: Students write short compositions, letters, postcards, journal entries, notes, messages, and short descriptions.
5. Grammatical topics: Forms of address (Sie, du, ihr); noun genders (der, die, das, die pl.), definite and indefinite articles; plurals; verb tense & conjugation (present tense, future); word order & position of the verb in statements, questions and dependent clauses; nominative & accusative cases; adjective endings in the nominative & accusative cases; negation; modal verbs & imperatives; separable-prefix verbs; accusative prepositions; comparatives & superlatives (including adjectives); regular & irregular verbs; personal pronouns (nominative and accusative); simple past of haben, sein & modal verbs; der- & ein-words; verbs with stem-changes in the present tense; position of nicht in statements & questions
6. Vocabulary topics: greetings and expressions of courtesy; the alphabet & cardinal numbers; classroom vocabulary, academic subjects, family & friendship vocabulary, adjectives (physical, personality & emotion description); expressing likes, dislikes & preferences; clothing; colors; time expressions: months, days, dates; seasons & weather; free time activities; making requests & giving advice; comparing qualities and characteristics; talking about whom & what you know and events in the past

7. Culture: Students acquire cultural information for the purpose of understanding and appreciating the products, practices, and perspectives of other cultures. Topics include: social implications of du, ihr & Sie; landscapes & climates in the German-speaking countries; university life; why German & English are similar; the Anglos & the Saxons; the cuckoo clock; Liechtenstein; ethnic diversity in Germany; English words in German; Austria; family life in the German-speaking countries; Switzerland; railways in the German-speaking countries; soccer; Munich; vacationing on a shoestring; paid vacations in North America & Europe; South Tyrol
