

This summer's projects focus on safety and guest experience in the Garden and include the following:

- The wooden entry gates and wood on the square shelter have been bleached by the sun and will be stained. This should return them to their original beauty.
- This year, Horticulturist Sam Kaufman and his helpers removed 14 barrels weighing thirty-gallons each of pine candles. Each of these small pieces of pine new growth are painstakingly removed one at a time - by hand.



- · The eastern end on the north side requires the addition of sheet piling to control erosion. This work is scheduled to begin this fall, and will include landscape restoration in that area.
- Boulder work in the waterfall will result in an improved water performance-look for the "carp rock" as the water dances in an arc as it hits the boulder.
- Thanks to the Upper Midwest Koi Society, three koi were added and hundreds of sunnies were trapped and released into the marsh pond.


