This course will evaluate the prehistory and cultures in Minnesota from the earliest prehistoric human presence to the time of contact with European settlements. Students will examine how the physical remains of past cultures in Minnesota are used to reconstruct the past. The focus will be on the environmental and resource factors that affected these early cultural groups in Minnesota.

- 1. The nature, scope, and history of archaeology in Minnesota
- 2. Application of the scientific method to examining the chronology of cultural traditions in Minnesota
- 3. Application of the scientific method to examining the impact of geological forces to the formation of the landscape of Minnesota
- 4. The peopling of Minnesota
- 5. The exploitation of resources in the natural landscape, and the domestication of plants and animals
- 6. The transition in early Native lifeways Post-Contact with European settlers
- 7. Conflicts between Native Americans and Euro-American settlers in the early 19<sup>th</sup> century
