### C. OUTLINE OF MAJOR CONTENT AREAS

- 1. Listening: understanding simple dialogues and classroom instructions; participating in small and large group exchanges
- 2. Speaking: talking about oneself (interests, feelings, family and daily activities, etc.)
- 3. Reading: understanding the content of basic written materials such as cultural information, menus, schedules, advertisements, etc.
- 4. Writing: writing short compositions such as a brief letter, postcard, journal entries, notes, messages and short descriptions
- 5. Culture: acquiring cultural information for the purpose of understanding and appreciating the products, practices, and perspectives of other cultures

### D. LEARNING OUTCOMES
