

Course Outline for: EAP 0960 College Communication for English Language Learners

This course for English Language Learners provides instruction in the reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills necessary for success and self-advocacy in college, workplace, and community settings. Topics include grammar and vocabulary, paragraph and short essay writing, responding to diverse texts, note-taking, and giving classroom presentations.

C. Outline of Major Content Areas

Students will develop proficiency in the following reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills, as preparation for college-level course work:

- 1. Vocabulary acquisition
- 2. Comprehension, analysis, and interpretation of diverse written and spoken texts
- 3. Writing conventions of U.S. colleges, including essay structure and source documentation
- 4. Grammar and mechanics for a wide U.S. college audience
- 5. Conversation and discussion skills
- 6. U.S. college culture
- 7. Digital literacy
- 8. Strategies and self-monitoring for independent learning

D. Course Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate increased academic and everyday vocabulary, including diverse cultural references, in writing and speaking assignments
- 2. Demonstrate reading and listening comprehension of diverse fiction and nonfiction texts
- 3. Identify structural and rhetorical choices (including audience, purpose, and tone) in diverse written and spoken texts
- 4. Demonstrate summarizing, paraphrasing, outlining, and note-taking skills
- 5. Demonstrate a recursive process of composing, revising, editing, and proofreading to produce coherent, correctly formatted essays

- 6. Identify, analyze, and use evidence to support ideas, including U.S. conventions of source evaluation and documentation
- 7. Use verb forms, sentence variety, other grammar features, and mechanics to communicate clearly in writing and speaking
- 8. Demonstrate speaking and listening skills for communication and self-advocacy with college employees, classmates, and community members
- 9. Complete various academic tasks using digital media
- 10. Continue building college success skills and use appropriate resources for help

E. Methods for Assessing Student Learning

Students will be assessed using the following methods:

- 1. Informal and formal writings that build toward longer writing assignments
- 2. Text comprehension and analysis activities

Other assessments may include:

- 1. Quizzes and tests
- 2. Collaborative discussions of readings and writing
- 3. In-class assignments and small group activities
- 4. Projects and presentations
