

Common Course Outline for: EngC 0900, Preparation for College Writing

A. Course Description

- 1. Number of credits: 4
- 2. Lecture hours per week: 4 Lab hours per week: None
- 3. Prerequisites: Placement into EngC 0900 and eligibility for READ 0960, or a Pass/C or better in EngC 0800 and eligibility for READ 0960
- 4. Co-requisites None
- 5. MnTC Goals: None

This course focuses on writing skills needed to write essays. During the semester, students 1) understand the planning and writing process for thesis-focused, multiparagraph essays; 2) develop ideas in paragraphs containing a topic sentence, clear order, adequate detail, transitions, and a conclusion; 3) become familiar with the basic process of research and citation; 4) demonstrate conventional grammatical sentence structure, punctuation, and spelling; 5) move towards college level vocabulary and usage. Sources for writing model analysis and study include published articles and essays and assigned student work. Grading options are A-F or Pass/No Credit. A grade of Pass/C or better is required to register for EngC 1101.

- 1. Demonstrate how writing can change based on audience, purpose, context, and expected genre.
- 2. Use writing processes: prewriting, drafting, revising, editing, and responding to peer and instructor feedback.
- 3. Write unified multi-paragraph essays with a clear thesis developed in coherent paragraphs that use a variety of sentence structures.

- 4. Demonstrate development of focused ideas in writing sustained by relevant and specific evidence and explanations, thereby showing critical thinking.
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to analyze, synthesize and integrate the ideas of others into one's own words.
- 6. Practice editing skills to enhance clarity for effective communication and to correct distracting errors in grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
