A.Course Description

C. Outline of Major Content Areas:

This course examines critical issues in women's health. Topics will include biological, cultural, global, psychological, historical, and political areas that shape and define women's health and healthcare choices. We will explore behavior which promote or compromise women's health and the philosophy of an integrative approach to optimal health.

D. Course Learning Outcomes:

- Comprehend the historical aspects of women's health and the impact the women's movement, advocacy and consumer groups have on women's healthcare today.
- Identify the potential of an integrative approach to achieving optimal healthcare.
- Analyze the link between gender relations, science, legal perspectives, and women's healthcare.
- Analyze how racism, sexism, classism, etc. has affected women's health from a global perspective.
- Evaluate how factors such as gender, race, cultural perspectives, and socioeconomic status align with your role as a responsible citizen in local and global communities.
- Identify behaviors that tend to promote or compromise women's health.
- Discuss the interrelatedness of biological, cultural, psychological, historical, and political areas that shape women's healthcare.
- Explain physical, social, emotional, occupational, mental, spiritual, and intellectual factors which influence health behaviors.
- Critique health differentials and causes of illness across various stages of women's lives in the United States as well as the global community.
