- 6. Explore the ways by which gender overlaps with other status categories (i.e race, class, sexuality, ability, etc.) and influences experiences and opportunities (Goal 2a, 2b, 2c, 5c, 5d 9b, 9c).
- 7. Analyze the history and role of the Women's Movement in the United States and cross-culturally (Goal 2c, 5b, 9d, 9e).
