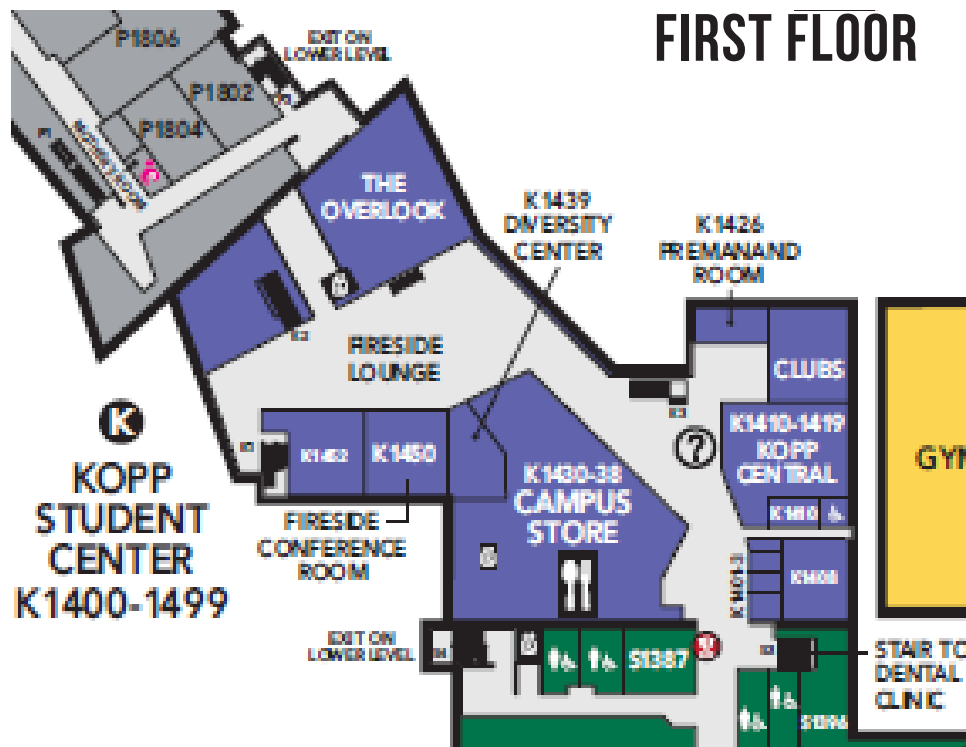

Peter Geye is the author of the award-winning novels *Safe from the Sea*; *The Lighthouse Road*; *Wintering*, winner of the Minnesota Book Award; *Northernmost*; *The Ski Jumpers*; and *A Lesser Light*.

Geye received his MFA from the University of New Orleans and his PhD from Western Michigan University, where he was editor of *Third Coast*. Born and raised in Minneapolis, he continues to live there with his family.

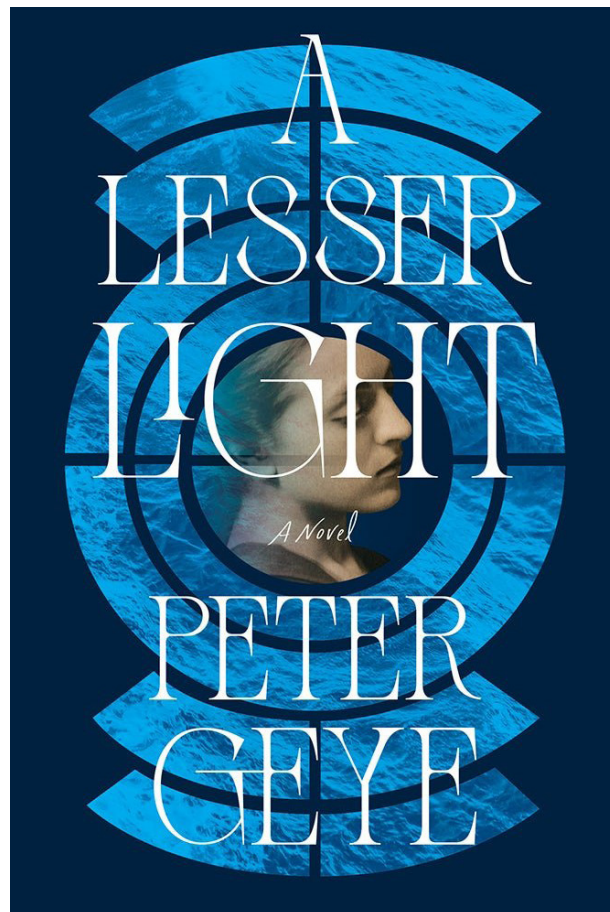
A LESSER LIGHT

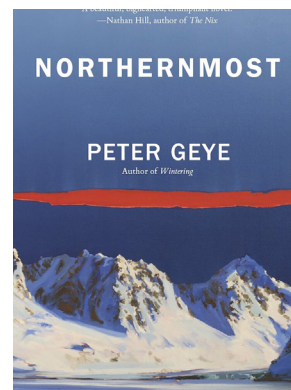
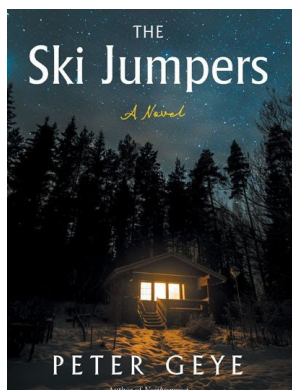

DAN DARLING

Dan Darling's first novel *Archaeopteryx* was a finalist for the New Mexico-Arizona book award. He speaks four languages, has traveled to twenty countries, and has worked as a circus performer, bartender, IRS agent, and magician. Having earned his MFA in creative writing at the University of New Mexico, Dan is now a multi award-winning educator in Minnesota.



THOMAS MALTMAN

Thomas Maltman's first novel, *The Night Birds*, won an Alex Award, a Spur Award, and the Friends of American Writers Literary Award. In 2009 the American Library Association chose *The Night Birds* as an "Outstanding Book for the College Bound." *Little Wolves*, his second novel, was a finalist for the Minnesota Book Award and won the All Iowa Reads selection in 2014. He teaches at Normandale Community College and lives in the Twin Cities area with his wife, a Lutheran pastor, and his three daughters. His third novel, *The Land*, was published by Soho Press in October, 2020. In July of 2025, Soho Press will publish his fourth novel, *Ashes to Ashes*.

MATT MAUCH

Matt Mauch is the author of five books of lyrical prose and poetry, including *A Northern Spring*. Mauch's work has appeared in numerous journals and has been recognized by the Minnesota State Arts Board and as a finalist for National Poetry Series and other national and international contests. Mauch lives in Minneapolis and teaches in the AFA in Creative Writing program at Normandale Community College. He and his books can be found online at mauchmauch.com.



ANNA GEORGE MEEK

Anna George Meek (she/her) has published in *Poetry*, *The Kenyon Review*, *The Yale Review*, and dozens of other national literary journals. She is the recipient of a \$25,000 National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, and two Minnesota State Arts Board grants. She has three nationally prizewinning books of poetry, *Acts of Contortion*, *Engraved*, and *The Genome Rhapsodies*. Having taught creative writing for 30 years at homeless shelters, domestic violence shelters, juvenile detention centers, schools, and non-profits, Meek is currently faculty at Normandale and Hamline University. She also: sings professionally for the VocalEssence Ensemble Singers; has played violin for more than 200 weddings; can operate a backhoe; leads wilderness canoe trips; and lives in South Minneapolis with her family and an exuberantly affectionate pitbull named Camille.

ERIC MEIN

Eric Mein is an instructor in the English department at Normandale Community College. He earned his B.A. in English Language and Literature from the University of Maryland, College Park, and his M.F.A. in Writing from Hamline University. He has been a servant of the Unseelie Court since 2019, when he stumbled into Faerie during an ill-fated camping trip and had to swear allegiance to the Queen of Air and Darkness in exchange for being allowed to leave. He also enjoys putting ridiculous lies in his bios for the entertainment of those who read them.



JENNIFER MILLER

Jennifer Miller is a faculty member in English at Normandale and a registered yoga teacher. She thinks writing is not just an activity of the mind, but something that should be approached holistically—mind, body, and spirit. When she's not in the classroom or with her family, Dr. Miller can be found outside, probably looking for birds.



PATRICK O'DONNELL

Originally from Ireland, Patrick has been teaching at Normandale since 1999 and enjoys exploring the intersections of literary history, myth, spirituality, and biography in his teaching and research, particularly in Modern World Literature. Outside Normandale, he edits and writes both fiction and nonfiction for the online quarterly arts journal *Celtic Junction Arts Review* and is Chairperson of the Dublin-based international AE Russell Society (www.ae-georgerussell.ie).

LYNETTE REINI-GRANDELL

Lynette Reini-Grandell is the author of the memoir *Wild Things: A Trans-Glam-Punk-Rock Love Story*. It's the story of how her spouse came out as trans in 1988, went public through fronting the rock band All the Pretty Horses beginning in the 1990s, and how they navigated an often-hostile, anti-trans environment. Above all, it's a love story of two people navigating the changes in their lives to remain committed to each other. She is also the author of the poetry collections *Wild Verge* and *Approaching the Gate*, winner of the 2015 Northeastern Minnesota book award for poetry. She teaches English and creative writing at Normandale Community College and the Loft. She has received support from her work from the Finlandia Foundation and was awarded a 2025 grant from the Minnesota State Arts Board. A multidisciplinary collaborator, she performs at spoken word venues with the Bosso Poetry Company and the jazz collective, Sonoglyph, and her poetry is part of a permanent installation at the Carlton Arms Art Hotel in Manhattan. She lives in Minneapolis on the ancestral homeland of the Dakota people.



MOLLY SKJEI

Molly Skjei has taught Art History at Normandale since 2006. She is a medieval history nerd, enjoys conceptual art, and will not entertain theories about aliens building ancient monuments.



STEVE WOODWARD

Steve Woodward has sixteen years of experience in the publishing industry. As a senior editor at Graywolf Press, he edited winners of the Booker Prize and the NBCC Award, and finalists for the Pulitzer Prize and National Book Award.
